

EDITORIAL

Dear Readers.

We are pleased to share with you the 2022 Issue 4 (Volume 19, Issue 4, December 2022) of the Journal of Education and Research in Nursing.

To increase the quality of nursing care, to improve care outcomes, to make a difference in patient care outcomes, to standardize nursing care, to increase nurse satisfaction, to make effective and correct decisions, to solve clinical problems, to innovate practices, to minimize application errors and to achieve excellence in the health system, it is vital and necessary that nursing practice is evidence-based. In this context, research should be conducted and published in line with scientific and ethical principles. In order for a study carried out in accordance with scientific and ethical principles to be published in a qualified journal, the article should have the feature of 3 C (Clarity, Conciseness and Correctness); repetition, ambiguity and exaggeration should not be included in the article; the main axis of the study should not be deviated; standard rules should be followed; the article should be written according to the writing instructions stated in the journal; the most appropriate journal should be selected; there should be a problem definition including the reason for the study, its difference from similar studies and which gap it will fill for the relevant country; information about the research questions or hypothesis should be mentioned; professional support from a statistician should be sought; the article should be checked for language before submission and submitted to only one journal. In this context, together with the rapid increase in the number of national and international scientific publications, it is important to meticulously use the current and best published evidence in combination with clinical expertise for providing quality nursing care.

I am pleased to announce that our journal is indexed in the databases of Tubitak Ulakbim Medicine (2012), EBSCO (2017), CINAHL (2017), DOAJ (2021), and GALE (2022), CNKI (2022) and we are working to publish our journal within the framework of international academic publishing standards. The studies with a high level of evidence from you have been instrumental in achieving these goals, and we know how important the valuable contributions of our journal's stakeholders, our readers, editors, managing director and advisory board members are.

As for our December 2022 issue, a total of 15 studies, including nine valuable original studies and five reviews and one case report are presented in this issue. The titles of the articles are as follows:
